

An environmental education and job training program that prepares individuals for 100+ jobs and career pathways, reentry and successful reintegration, and to improve conditions in their communities.



ROOTS OF SUCCESS offers a multimedia, activity-based curriculum customized for prisons, jails, and reentry programs. Taught by incarcerated Instructors trained and certified to teach and mentor their peers, ROS is easy and affordable to implement. The teaching approach and content is designed to immediately engage participants. ROS prepares individuals for reentry and 100+ jobs and career pathways, and to improve conditions in their communities.

Supports Reentry and Reduces Recidivism

- 98% of graduates feel better prepared for job interviews
- 97% of graduates are more knowledgeable green careers
- 96% of graduates are motivated to pursue employment opportunities they did not previously know were accessible to them
- Incarcerated ROS graduates are hired to work in sustainability programs in prisons
- Reentering ROS graduates are hired by employers in multiple sectors of the economy

In April 2021, ROS became the first DOL "Environmental Literacy Instructor" Apprenticeship in the nation.

"Oftentimes in prisons people go off into their little groups, but ROS brought people out of those groups and tied them together. I would see more connections. 
ROS Supports Institutional Goals

TO OFFER ROOTS OF SUCCESS

Programs schedule a Train-the-Instructor training for the individuals who will teach the ROS course. Instructors leave the training with all of the teaching materials and multimedia content needed to teach ROS and receive ongoing technical assistance. A few weeks before the class begins, programs order Student Workbooks for each participant. Students who complete the course receive a Certificate valued by employers and educational institutions. In some settings, students receive college credit for taking the course. There is also an Apprenticeship program.
